FOREWORD

The Census of Population was taken on the night of 21/22 April under powers conferred by "The Census Ordinance, 1990". The States Supervisor, F. Norman Le Cheminant, I.S.O., B.Sc.(Econ)., F.C.I.S., served as Chief Registrar, and the Head of Economics and Statistics, John Dickson, Ph.D., B.Sc., as the Census Supervisor.

The Census Report has been prepared for the Chief Registrar and the President of the Population and Migration Committee by the Census Supervisor. The Committee in its turn has discharged its responsibilities by transmitting a copy of this Report to the President of the States of Guernsey for the information of States Members.

The Committee wishes to acknowledge the co-operation it received from the public during the taking of the Census and the assistance it had from States departments. It wishes to record its gratitude to the United Kingdom Office of Population, Censuses and Surveys for the help afforded to it and also to the Urban Research and Policy Evaluation Regional Research Laboratory at the University of Manchester for help with analysing the Census.

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

GUERNSEY CENSUS 1991

GENERAL EXPLANATORY NOTES

1. Census Population

The census is a count of all persons resident in Guernsey, Herm, Jethou or Lihou at midnight, 21/22 April 1991, whether those persons are present or temporarily absent from the Islands at the time. The census population figure does not include visitors to the Islands, whether from the U.K. or elsewhere, or the crews or passengers of ships moored in the Island harbours (unless permanently resident). This definition is different to those of earlier censuses (1971 and before) when all persons present at midnight would have been counted as the censul population. The current "residential" definition requires a considerable follow up of the resident population (up to three months after the census) to ensure that all persons normally resident in Guernsey are included in the census population.

2. Censal Population

The censal population refers to all persons present at midnight on 21/22 April 1991. The censal population, therefore, includes visitors to Guernsey and excludes absent residents. Less effort is expended in deriving this total, since all reports and tables refer to the resident population.

3. Visitor

A visitor is defined as any person who normally resides outside Guernsey, Herm, Jethou or Lihou and is not working or seeking work in Guernsey and is visiting Guernsey for less than one month from the date of arrival. All other persons are considered as resident. Note that persons who had been guests in hotels and guesthouses for over one month would have been considered resident, even if they considered themselves visitors.

4. Comparison with earlier censuses

No changes have been made in the boundaries of civil parishes. As noted above, the figures for censuses prior to 1976 included visitors and excluded absent residents, whereas those for 1976 onwards are of the resident population.

5. The census form

A copy of the main census form is attached to this report. There was also a private census form for those individuals who were part of another household wishing to make a separate personal return.

6. Definitions

Dwelling

A building or part of a building which included some separate living accommodation was counted as a dwelling, whether that accommodation was occupied or not. Thus, a building containing at least one household, occupied or unoccupied, is counted as a dwelling. Buildings without accommodation are considered solely as buildings and will not be included in any count of dwellings. Where houses or other buildings have been adapted to provide residential accommodation in smaller units, these units were regarded as dwellings only if they were structurally separate and self-contained. Households separated from each other by a common staircase or landing were not counted as separate dwellings.

Room

An interior portion of a dwelling divided off by walls or sliding or fixed partitions. However, small rooms not used for sleeping or living accommodation were excluded. Therefore, the number of rooms in a household's accommodation excluded small kitchens less than 2 metres wide; bathrooms and toilets; closets; pantries; garages; halls, landings, lobbies or recesses; small storerooms; offices or shops used solely for business purposes. A large room divided by a fixed or sliding partition is counted as two rooms, but one divided by curtains or portable screens is one room.

Private Household

A private household is taken to be one person or a group of persons living at the same address sharing common housekeeping (shared meals or shared lounge). A lodger who has one meal per day with a household (e.g. breakfast) is included with that household. However, a person having no meals with the household and no shared lounge or T.V. viewing area would be classified as a separate household, even if the kitchen and bathroom facilities were shared. Further, a group of persons sharing one room, but not necessarily eating together on a regular basis and not taking meals provided by another household in the same dwelling, would be classed as one household. Thus, a group of hostelry workers sharing a room would be classified as one household and not as several separate households.

Communal households

Communal households are taken as those which include five or more unrelated persons. In general these would be residential homes, hospitals, hotels and other large establishments. However, also included would be lodging houses classified as such and large shared flats or informal lodging houses discovered during the course of the census.

Tenure

Householders were asked whether their dwelling was inscribed on the Housing Register and then whether they owned or rented the dwelling. If owning, they were asked whether this was owned outright or through a loan, whether from the States or otherwise. If renting, they were asked whether furnished or unfurnished and whether from the States or from a private landlord.

7. Position in Household

The first named person on the census form was taken to be the householder. The householder was generally that person identified by the census enumerator as willing to be responsible for the completion of the personal and household details on the census form. Householders were asked to indicate the relationship of each person in the household to themselves.

8. Economically active persons

These were all persons other than visitors aged over 15 who were either in employment at any time during the week prior to census night; either as an employee, self-employed alone, or self-employed employing others. Employment includes, in addition to working for an employer, work on ones own account, part-time work even if only for a few hours, casual or temporary work of any kind and unpaid work in a family business.

9. Economically inactive

The economically inactive population comprises those who were either under 15 or full-time at school; wholly retired; full-time students; permanently sick or disabled, or otherwise full-time at home.

10. Duration of stay of migrants

The census analysis relies on the division of newcomers into three categories:-

- (a) Short-term. That is, being in the Island under a year. More specifically, anyone taking up residence in 1990 or 1991 will be classified as short-term.
- (b) One to Five years. That is, being in the Island between one and five years. More specifically, anyone taking up residence between and including the years of 1985 and 1989.
- (c) Over Five years. That is, being in the Island over five years. More specifically, anyone taking up residence in or before 1984.

COMMENTARY

INTRODUCTION

The States resolved on 27th July 1989 to conduct a Census on 21st April 1991; the Census Ordinance being approved on 13th December 1990. A Census has been held every ten years from 1821 until 1971, and every five years since 1971. The population reported has been censal until 1971, and resident from 1976 onwards. The censal population is a count of persons present in the Island on census night.

RESIDENT POPULATION

The term 'resident population' was taken to comprise all persons normally resident in Guernsey, Herm or Jethou at midnight on Census Day whether or not they were actually present in the Island at that time. Census Day in 1991 was 21st April. Residents returning to the Island after Census Day and before the end of July had an opportunity to complete a census form.

The census date coincided with that chosen by the United Kingdom, but not with that of Jersey. It occurred some three weeks after Easter in contrast to that of 1986, which was held one week before Easter (23rd March). Typically censuses are held in mid-April and so the 1991 census is comparable with most previous years.

The resident population was found to be 58,867, an increase of 3,385 over 1986. The population total and population increases for previous censuses are shown in Table 1. There were 2,718 residents absent from Guernsey and 1,799 non-residents or visitors present on census night. Thus the censal population was 57,948 as compared to the resident population of 58,867.

MIGRATION

The increase of 3,385 from 1986 to 1991 can be divided between net migration and natural increase. Of this, 2,901 is due to net migration and 484 to natural increase. This is summarised below:-


About two-thirds of the total increase in population has been in the parishes of Castel, Vale and St. Sampson's (Table 2).



MIGRATION AND POPULATION

As stated in the 1976 Guernsey Census report, "It was States concern about the apparent rapid rise in the Island's population which led them as early as March 1973, to resolve that a limited housing census be carried out in 1976" (Billet d'Etat II 1973). In addition in 1975 a Working Party was formed to estimate population. This was dissolved in 1982, but again, continuing concern about population and unemployment led to the formation of the Population and Migration Committee on 30th January 1985, which has overseen the 1991 census.

It is against the concern for population and employment that the census of 1976 and later can be compared. The 1991 census shows the following main findings:-

- A large increase in the number of economically active. We have to go back to the 1976 census to find an increase of a similar magnitude.
- 2. A similar level of immigration to previous censuses and a lower level of emigration comparable to the 1981-86 period.

- 3. A larger natural increase than the last census due to those members of the last baby boom (up to 1973) reproducing.
- 4. A larger number (about 800) of short-term workers (staying under one year) in the population. Of these, 300 should be discounted because the 1991 census was one month later than the 1986 census. This leaves an increase of 500 short term workers in 1991 compared to 1986.

6. The remaining increase in the economically active is due to increased participation by females of all ages and males aged 55-59. Contrary-wise the economic activity of those aged 15-19 has fallen no doubt due to fewer leaving school before the age of 19.

There can be little doubt that the economic boom of recent years which peaked in 1986 has brought more immigrants (Table C in Appendix). States policies in recent years have encouraged the use of more short-term labour and the effectiveneness of these policies is shown in the greater number of these workers in the population. The strength of the economy, in particular the Island's per capita income, which in 1991 stands at about £14,000 (higher than the U.K.), contributes to the lower rate of emigration experienced this decade.

A simplistic picture of migration

It is possible to give a simplistic picture of an "average" year in 1980s based on both the census results and the annual migration studies of persons working as recorded by the States Insurance Authority.

- (a) About 100 more of the population have become economically active each year.
- (b) Immigration has averaged about 800 per year (excluding short-term workers) roughly split between 500 economically active and 300 economically inactive.
- (c) The net increase in migrant population (that is excluding shortterm workers) is about 450 per year with 300 of these being economically active.
- (d) By subtraction (column c below) emigration is 200 economically active and 150 economically inactive per year.

Immigrants: 1991 and 1986 compared

A comparison between the 1986 and 1991 censuses show that the difference in immigration is due to both short-term and long-term workers. There has been a decrease in those who are economically inactive. It may be that States' policies of encouraging more short-term workers has prevented a larger increase in long-term workers and the economically inactive.

The ages and five year age groups of the 1991 Census are shown in Table 3. Further combination into three age groups reveals:-

- (a) after falling for several years, the number of children has increased;
- (b) the continuing growth in those of working age (15-64);
- (c) the continuing smaller growth in those aged over 65.

The concern of many countries is the ageing population and the number of people of working age who support those who are not working (the dependency ratio). Projections of the 1986 census population showed an increasing ageing population in Guernsey which would need to be supported by proportionately fewer exocordically active persons. However, the 1991 census shows an increase in those of working age and this has the effect of reducing, in the short-term, concern about the number of dependants per person of working age. The 1991 census shows that most of the increase in population is among working age people (i.e. aged 15-64). (Figure 4)



Marital Status

Most of the long-term trends already seen in the 1986 census have been continued into the 1991 census. There is an increase in single persons as well as those divorced and a corresponding decrease in those married and widowed. This is in keeping with social trends within the U.K.

ECONOMIC ACTIVITY

1. Definition

The economically active were all persons aged over 15 who were in employment at any time during the week prior to census night.


Conversely, the economically <u>inactive</u> were those not in employment at the time of the census, even though they may have worked at other times of the year, for example in summer jobs. Many of these persons would have considered themselves full-time at home. Those at school or university during term time were excluded, even if they did paid work during the holiday period around the census.

2. Where they work

The total economically active have risen from 27,689 in 1986 to 30,162 in 1991, an increase of 8.9%. This compares with an increase of 5.0% in the 1986 census. The most significant increase was in the finance sector, which has increased by 37% from 3,464 in 1986 to 4,743 in 1991. There were also increases in construction, selling and health, as well as a significant increase in hostelry. Much of this latter increase is due to residential homes (which are considered part of hostelry) and restaurants rather than hotels. There has been a decline in the number employed in manufacturing and horticulture. The move from a "producing" economy to a "service" economy is further highlighted by the total increase of those in services (personnel, recreational, cultural, business and information). The service sector increased by 613, reflecting increased use of services by both businesses and individuals. The increase of 593 in construction reflected the buoyancy in building at the time but is overstated because some of the "other active" classified in 1986 were employed in construction. There was a decline of 416 in manufacturing. (Figure 5)

Many occupations were not as well coded in 1986 as they were in 1991, so making detailed comparisons difficult.

4. Economically Active by Age

The economically active have increased to 51.2% of the population. Thus, the trend towards greater economic activity within the population has continued. The increase in those economically active from 50.0% to 51.2% is larger than the increase from 49.5% to 50.0% over the period 1981 to 1986. In numbers the economically active of working age have increased from 26,848 to 29,364, an increase of 2,516. (Net migration increased by 2,901). The economically active within the 15 to 64 age group was 74.2%, a considerable increase over the last census. This is mainly due to net migration, and secondly to internal factors such as the increased participation of married women in the labour force.

5. Economically Active by Sex

After being stagnant since 1976, the number of economically active males has increased by 1,055 during the intercensal period 1986 to 1991. There has been a corresponding increase for females of 1,418. Much of this increase has been due to increased economic activity among those of working age (15 to 64) and thus the long-term trend towards females being economically active continues. These increases mean that 56.8% of those economically active are male and 43.2% female.

6. Employment Status

The continuing trend to those working as employees rather than being self-employed has continued in 1991, with 26,017 classifying themselves as employees compared to 23,282 in 1986. This means that the self-employed are a decreasing proportion of the Island's work force.

OCCUPIED HOUSEHOLDS

Households were divided between communal and private.

Communal households

Communal households are taken as those which include five or more unrelated persons. In general these would be residential homes, hospitals, hotels and other large establishments. However, also included would be lodging houses classified as such and large shared flats or informal lodging houses discovered during the course of the census.

A total of 432 communal establishments containing 3,464 persons were found as shown in Table 13. This was a considerable increase in the numbers found in previous censuses.

Private households

There were 21,215 private households containing 55,403 residents. The trend in household creation shows a large increase in the last five years; a similar magnitude to that of 1971 to 1976. The increase in household formation has meant a consequent fall in the number of persons per household; density has fallen from 2.70 in 1986 to 2.61 in 1991.

Household tenure

The 1991 Census showed an increase in the percentage of households in private let (21.2% compared to 20.7% in 1986) and States let (10.4% compared to 10.1% in 1986) and a consequent decrease in owner occupied households (68.5% compared to 69.2% in 1986). In actual numbers, owner occupied households have risen from 13,606 to 14,516 from 1986 to 1991.

The density (number of persons per household) is smallest in private lets and greatest in States lets. Owner occupied densities are somewhere in between. In all types of tenure, household density has fallen each census since 1971. This is consistent with modern economic trends toward small households.

Domestic Facilities

The exclusive use of a bath or shower and the exclusive use of an indoor toilet has now become almost ubiquitous. Rented accommodation from the States is the leading category of tenure. Just over 50% of all households have central heating in all rooms.

- (a) The numbers of returning Guernsey born in the intercensal periods 1981-85 (913) and 1986-90 (862) are quite similar.
- (b) Excluding Guernsey born persons, there was an increase of 687 in the number of intercensal immigrants (from 4,178 in the period 1981 to 1985 to 4,865 in the period 1986 to 1990).
- (c) The summary table in paragraph 2 shows that the increase was almost entirely due to economically active persons.
- (d) Many of the increased migrants are short-term workers.
