## Insect deterrents and insect killers for vehicles.

Midges (*Cluicoides species*) are potential vectors for certain animal diseases such as Bluetongue & Schmallenberg Virus. To reduce the risk of inadvertently bringing potentially infected midges to Guernsey in vehicles when importing livestock it is recommended that the vehicles are sprayed before animals are loaded into them in England, France, Jersey, Alderney or Sark. No products are specifically licensed for repelling or killing midges but the following are recommended by the Institute of Animal Health, Pirbright, UK. Whatever product is used it is important to follow manufacturers instructions, record details of use and observe any withdrawal periods. Individuals administering the products should take precautions to minimise their risk of exposure.
