INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the Bailiwick of Guernsey's Children and Young People's Plan (CYPP) for 2023-2026. The CYPP sets out how we will continue to support children and families across our Islands, building upon the achievements and outcomes from the CYPP 2016-2022. The core focus and achievement of that CYPP was in requiring and enabling those who support children and families to come together, to work in partnership with each other to identify and achieve shared goals and outcomes. Through the CYPP 2016-2022 we established multi-agency and multi-disciplinary support and a preventative offer that did not previously exist on our Islands. Our new plan aims to continue this great work.

Whilst our Island communities have started to recover and move forward from the COVID-19 pandemic, the impact clearly hindered our ability to deliver on some of our key objectives, as staff and financial resources were necessarily diverted. The landscape left behind is not the same, either in the Bailiwick or in the global context. For this reason, this new plan seeks to re-evaluate outstanding priorities, to consider them within our new context and to ensure that our aspirations are focussed on the current reality for our children and our services in the post-Covid world. There are huge challenges in resourcing in terms of people, skills and finance.

Our commitments to the four outcomes for children and young people remain unchanged and unwavering. We believe that all children and young people should be: safe and nurtured; healthy and active and thrive; enjoy and achieve; and participate in the decisions that affect them. Our enthusiasm and passion for improvising the lives of all children in the Bailiwick continues but extends with an increased focus upon those children which form a part of more vulnerable groups. This including focused actions around children in care, children with additional needs and disabilities, children for whom English is a second language and those children in receipt of uniform allowances.

However, we recognise that this plan needs to act as a focal point for existing strategies and processes, rather than adding an additional layer of bureaucracy and aspiration to actions that should already be "business as usual" for individual Committees. Our CYPP 2023-2026 aims to strengthen the excellent work that is taking place cross the Bailiwick by focussing on the key touch points where joint working and collaboration is core to success. This reflects the requirements of the Children Law whilst also recognising the range of work already in motion to build on the foundation of our previous CYPPs.

This new plan therefore:



Reviews the objectives and actions from the previous plan and identifies achievements as well as outstanding priorities;



Sets out several Key Performance Indicators linked to our four commitments which can only be achieved through cross-Committee working; and



Draws together and demonstrates where action is already underway or planned through several existing sub-strategies.

In this way, our new plan is clear about where responsibility lies and provides an overview of how our shared objectives can be achieved over the next three years. This will be a time of recovery and consolidation, where the impact of covid and other world events can be understood and reconciled to promote the welfare of our children and young people in our unique island communities.

GOVERNANCE

A robust and proportionate governance structure is central to monitoring progress against key priorities over the life span of the plan. As the political lead for the CYPP, the Committee for Health & Social Care is responsible and will provide oversight to the plan. The Committee for Health & Social Care has put in place a regular reporting structure which will ensure robust support, focus and challenge. This role will be undertaken through collaborative working with other key Committees whose mandates are engaged by the actions in the plan. It is intended that this reporting structure will act as an enabler to all of those with a role to play in ensuring outcomes are achieved. Progression of the various workstreams will be monitored through the CYPP Implementation Group which will consist of priority leads and other key professionals and representatives from across the community and the Committees involved; all of whom have a role to play in delivery of the plan.

THE CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE PLAN 2023-2026

This plan follows on from the Children & Young People's Plan 2016-2022 and the widespread consultation, engagement, and review that informed its delivery over those six years. During that period, the way in which the Islands have focussed resources to improve our working together for the best interests of children and young people has been transformed. This multidisciplinary approach has now become our 'business as usual' and is incorporated into the individual business plans of the relevant lead Committees. However, the impact of the pandemic and other global issues have meant that resources, and in particular people resources were necessarily diverted to respond to the pandemic, which has undermined the full achievement of all of our previous objectives. Progress against our objectives is set out in part 2 of this plan.

Given these unprecedented extenuating circumstances we propose this plan focuses on those objectives that are currently red - that is, those that have not yet been achieved - and to build on the strong foundations of multiagency working and co-operation established through the CYPP 2016-2022 and its supporting processes. Given those foundations, our approach will be to include in this CYPP only those objectives that need cross-Committee working over and above the exiting business plans, over the next three years including the States of Guernsey's priorities as identified within the Government Work Plan 2022 where they relate to children and families. In that context, our reality reflects the global picture financial and people resources remain a major challenge and all objectives will need to be achieved within existing budgets, by adopting more creative approaches to service delivery, rather than seeking new investment.

Corporate Parenting Action Plan with its key focus on outcomes for children in care. Some. like the Our Education Strategy, are intended to meet the needs of all children in education whilst the recent National Association of Special Educational Needs (NASEN) Review will focus on improving outcomes for children and young people with SEND in the Bailiwick. Equally, the Review of the Children Law and Outcomes. one of the top-ten actions in the Government Work Plan, will also play a significant role in delivering the key priorities within this iteration of the CYPP as it seeks to reduce delay for children and young people whose lives are touched by the family care and justice system. This key implementation plan will be further supported by the progression of the Bailiwick's Justice Framework 2022-2029 as it provides the parameters for all areas of social justice including family justice and youth justice, and the role that they contribute towards the lives and outcomes of children and families. As such, it is through these key strategies, service developments and improvement plans that the priorities for the CYPP will aim to be delivered during the next three years.

THE CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S PLAN 2016 - 2022

The purpose of the Children and Young People's Plan is to make a difference in the lives of children and young people. Thus, when reflecting upon the outcomes achieved in the previous plan it is appropriate to commence by considering what young people say they are proud of or what has made a difference for them.

The achievements of Children in Care include: -

- A Year 9 student was proud of sporting achievement in the school football team.
- A Year 11 student was proud that they won a logo competition and now they are interested in graphic design.
- A Year 10 student is interested in design and is proud of their photography achievements and they have sold photos in local galleries.
- A Year 10 student is Media Champion and is proud to help organise charity events.

Also, Children in Care identified an area that needed improvement. They voiced that at times they are not sure who they can go to for advice or speak to when they are struggling. Adults in education settings supported them by provided reassurance about where and how to receive support including the Careers Service who support Children in Care with next steps and Action for Children who agreed to help explore pathways to employment for Children in Care working with other colleagues across the Bailiwick.

More broadly in ensuring the rights of children and young people are respected - UNICEF Rights Respecting School Award, 7 schools have achieved Bronze, 10 schools achieved Silver and 3 schools have achieved the Gold award ensuring that children's rights are respected and upheld and ensuring that young people have a say in decisions made about them.

The recently published Active Healthy kids Scorecard reports on the levels of physical activity within the Bailiwick's children and young people. Entitled 'Moving in the right direction' the report shows an increase in activity levels as well as highlighting the continued need for supporting local children to be more active. This is especially in relation to the increase in active travel amongst the Island's children which contributes to improved health, social, economic and community outcomes.



OUTCOMES OF THE CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S SURVEY

The Guernsey Young People's Survey has been undertaken since the early 1990s at three-year intervals. Pupils in years 6, 8, and 10 undertook the survey. They were asked more than 80 questions on topics such as drugs, alcohol, tobacco, sex and relationships, sport and physical activity participation, food and health, and emotional health. The 2019 Young People's Survey (YPS) shows that the majority of primary and secondary pupils do not meet recommendations. YPS 2022 showed a decline on 2019 figures. However, there is a slight upward trend over time.

2020 Health Improvement Commission study using wearable monitors showed 44% of children meet the UK Chief Medical Officers guidelines but that there are strong gender inequalities (61% boys, 33% girls).

The 2019 Young People's Survey demonstrated an increase in the activity levels of young people in years 6 and 10. However, the numbers that meet the UK Chief Medical Officer recommendations of an average of an hour per day of moderate to vigorous activity remains low (less than 20%).

Significant impact of lockdown

As part of the School Improvement Strategy self-evaluation cycle staff from the Health Improvement Commission and the Guernsey Sports Commission will visit each primary school to provide an objective review of the education establishment's performance regarding physical activity. Focus needs to be on creating sustainable whole-school approaches to physical activity which are embedded in the ethos of the school. Support also needed for groups who are less active (e.g. girls).
