

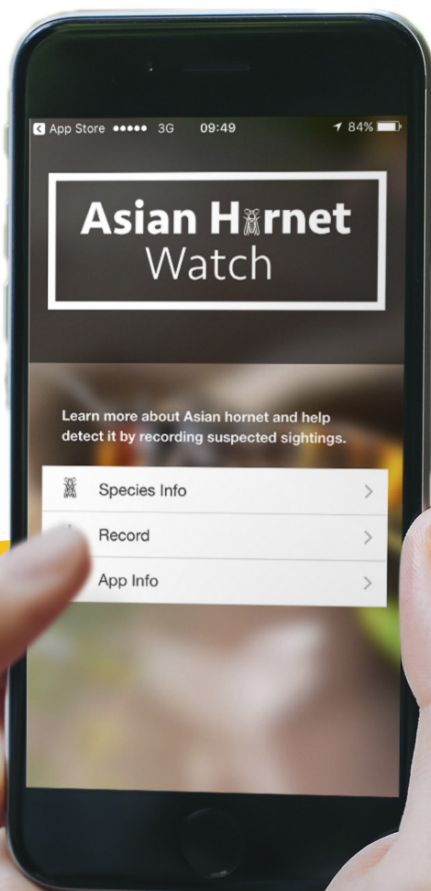
TR^{ACK} DON'T TRAMPLE

ASIAN HORNETS ARE IN GUERNSEY AND WE NEED YOUR HELP TO FIND THEM.

They were first recorded in the island last year, when two nests were found and destroyed. It is likely that queens from these nests have spent the winter here and will be emerging ready to build new nests. Our best defence against these alien invaders is to track down and destroy their nests. If they are able to establish, they will pose a threat to our local biodiversity and honey bees.

Asian Hornets can be hard to distinguish from some of our local bugs and bees. There is a handy ID guide on the back of this card.

If you do spot an Asian Hornet please DON'T TRAMPLE IT! Instead, we need you to take a picture and observe the direction it flies. Scientists can then use these records to track where the Hornet's nest is.

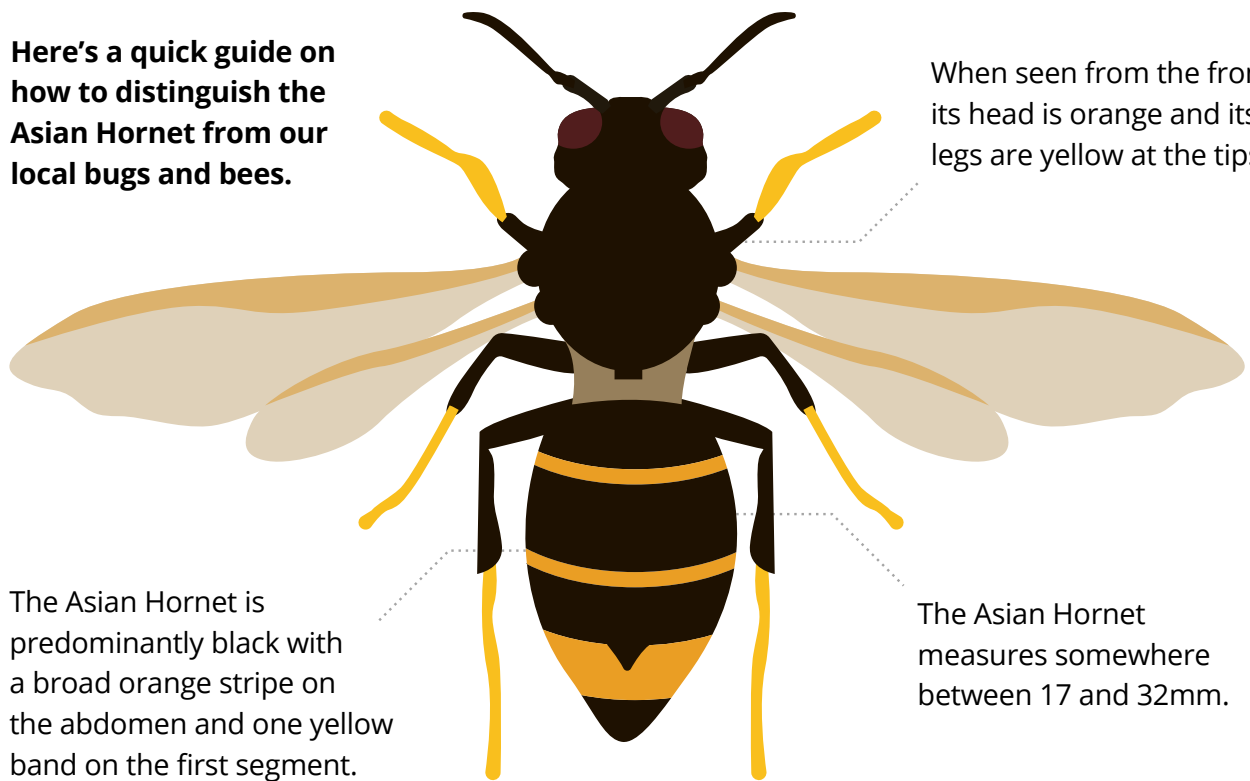


You can log your sightings of Asian Hornet using the Asian Hornet Watch app, available from App stores.

HOW TO SPOT AN **ASIAN HORNET**

Here's a quick guide on how to distinguish the Asian Hornet from our local bugs and bees.

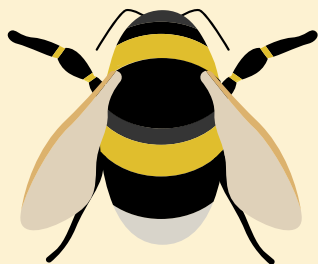


When seen from the front its head is orange and its legs are yellow at the tips.

The Asian Hornet is predominantly black with a broad orange stripe on the abdomen and one yellow band on the first segment.

The Asian Hornet measures somewhere between 17 and 32mm.
