The States are asked to decide:-

Whether, after consideration of the Policy Letter entitled "*Overseas Aid & Development Commission – Appointment of Commissioners*" dated 13th June 2022, they are of the opinion:-

- (i) To appoint Miss Judith Moore as a Commissioner on the Overseas Aid and Development Commission for a further 4 year term from 1st August 2022 until 31st July 2026;
- (ii) To appoint Mrs Margaret McGuinness as a Commissioner on the Overseas Aid and Development Commission for a further 4 year term from 1st August 2022 until 31st July 2026;
- (iii) To appoint Mr Bryan Pill as a Commissioner on the Overseas Aid and Development Commission for a further 4 year term from 1st August 2022 until 31st July 2026;
- (iv) To appoint Mr Christopher Gregg as a Commissioner on the Overseas Aid and Development Commission for a 4 year term from 1st August 2022 until 31st July 2026;
- (v) To appoint Dr Lindsay Jefferies as a Commissioner on the Overseas Aid and Development Commission for a 4 year term from 1st August 2022 until 31st July 2026; and
- (vi) To appoint Dr Michelle Le Cheminant as a Commissioner on the Overseas Aid and Development Commission for a 4 year term from 1st August 2022 until 31st July 2026;

1. Executive Summary

- 1.1 The purpose of this Policy Letter is to seek the approval of the States of Deliberation to re-appoint three of the Overseas Aid & Development Commission's Commissioners and to appoint three new Commissioners to replace three Commissioners whose maximum terms of office expire on 31st July 2022.
- 1.2 The Commissioners are appointed to serve four year terms and under the Commission's internal governance policies a Commissioner may serve a maximum term of 10 years although, as explained later in this Policy Letter, an exception to this internal policy is being proposed for one current Commissioner.
- 1.3 This Policy Letter asks the States of Deliberation to appoint:
 - (a) Miss Judith Moore, Mrs Margaret McGuinness, Mr Bryan Pill as Commissioners on the Overseas Aid and Development Commission for a further 4 year term until 31st July 2026; and
 - (b) Mr Christopher Gregg, Dr Lindsay Jefferies and Dr Michelle Le Cheminant as Commissioners on the Overseas Aid & Development Commission for a 4 year term from 1st August 2022.

2. Background

- 2.1 The Commission is a committee of the States of Guernsey which distributes funds voted by the States for aid and development overseas by making grants to charities

undertaking development and humanitarian work in the world's least developed countries, and by contributing to emergency and disaster relief.

2.2 The Commission's mandate is:

"To distribute funds voted by the States for aid and development overseas by making contributions to ongoing programmes and to emergency and disaster relief.

To develop programmes relating to the collection and distribution of funds involving the private sector.

To carry out its duties and powers in accordance with operational policies approved by the Policy & Resources Committee, and the strategic direction set by the States.

To fulfil the responsibilities set out in Annex One to the mandates of committees of the States."

2.3 The role of the Commission is to administer the budget approved by the States of Guernsey for overseas aid. The Commission's President is a member of the States of Deliberation and the six Commissioners are appointed by the States of Deliberation.

2.4 The Commission's 2022 budget is £3,225,000¹.

2.5 The purpose of overseas aid has been expressed in successive Policy Letters over the past 40 years². Guernsey gives in order to help provide for the basic needs of people in the poorest parts of the world – including health, education, clean water and food. The aim is to reduce human vulnerability and to promote sustainable change that will last beyond the lifespan of the project being funded. For the communities receiving aid from Guernsey, the benefits are both life-changing and often life-saving.

3. The "Retiring" Commissioners

3.1 Mr Philip Bodman, Ms Teresa de Nobrega and Dr Nick Paluch were first appointed as Commissioners in June 2012. Their appointment was renewed in June 2016 for a further two year term, and then again in July 2018 for a further four year term.

¹ That is £2,654,500 for Grant Aid, £360,000 for Disaster and Emergency Relief, £125,000 for Community Partnerships, £40,000 for Skills Partnerships, £45,500 for staff & promotion and administration.

² Between 1980 and April 2004, the Overseas Aid Committee was mandated to distribute funds voted by the States for aid and development overseas. In May 2004, the Guernsey Overseas Aid Commission replaced the former Committee and whilst its mandate remained largely unchanged, its membership changed. Between May 2004 and April 2016, the Commission's membership comprised a Chairman selected from the members of Policy Council and six Islanders appointed by the States on the recommendation of the Policy Council to serve as Commissioners.

- 3.2 Mr. Philip Bodman is a chartered accountant and graduate in agricultural Economics. Prior to returning to Guernsey, he spent ten years in overseas development work, including working in Papua New Guinea and South America. Mr. Bodman had a scholarship with the United Kingdom's Overseas Development Administration (the predecessor to the UK Department for International Development and now the UK Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office).
- 3.3 Mr Bodman has also maintained an interest in providing support to overseas development projects through his role as Missions Treasurer at Holy Trinity Church.
- 3.4 Mr. Bodman's agricultural background has been of great assistance to the other Commissioners when assessing the sustainability and viability of agricultural and horticultural projects.
- 3.5 Ms. Teresa de Nobrega is an Advocate with experience of both visiting less developed countries and initiating various charitable fundraising activities.
- 3.6 She is a Trustee of the Guernsey Blind association and an active local supporter of a number of NGOs including UNICEF, the International Red Cross and Amnesty International.
- 3.7 Ms. de Nobrega's legal background has been valued by her fellow Commissioners when considering the governance of the applicant charities and their in-country partners.
- 3.8 Dr Nicholas Paluch is a retired Medical Practitioner and qualified (non-practising) Barrister. He has undertaken volunteer work in several less developed countries whilst also maintaining an independent involvement in fundraising and overseas aid support activities, including visiting, at his own expense, a number of projects that have benefitted from financial support provided by Guernsey.
- 3.9 During his ten years as a Commissioner, Dr Paluch has visited as many as 30 Commission funded projects in eight different developing countries. He and his wife (a qualified midwife) have also worked as volunteers in several health clinics and hospitals supported by the Commission.
- 3.10 Dr Paluch's commitment to visiting countries where funding from the Commission has been used to provide development aid is much appreciated by the Commissioners. They acknowledge that these self-funded visits are beyond the normal role of a Commissioner but have provided an invaluable additional level of scrutiny and oversight on the impact and sustainability of the Commission's work.
- 3.11 The Commission wishes to record its grateful thanks to Mr Bodman, Ms de Nobrega and Dr Paluch for their commitment and hard work, especially the many hours each Commissioner spends reading and assessing each of the hundreds of applications for

Grant Aid Funding received each year, over the 10 years they have served on the Commission. The role of Commissioner is an unpaid one but one which requires a lot of work. Alongside their fellow Commissioners and those they have previously worked with, Mr Bodman, Ms de Nobrega and Dr Paluch have willingly made this high level of commitment in the knowledge that, as a result of their endeavours, some of the world's poorest communities receive development aid which will bring a life changing and sustainable improvement in their lives.

4. Re-Appointment of Commissioners

- 4.1 Miss Moore was first appointed in June 2012 for a four year term, reappointed in June 2016 for a further two year term, and reappointed again in July 2018 for a further four year term. Her current term of appointment ends on 31st July 2022. She has indicated her willingness to serve a further four year term.
- 4.2 Under the Commission's internal governance policies, a Commissioner may serve a maximum period of ten years. Miss Moore has now served ten years but, with three other Commissioners standing down, the replacement of four of the six Commissioners at the same time is considered to be an anomaly and will cause too high a loss of experience in one instance that would be difficult to accommodate. It would also make the Commission less resilient. Miss Moore, who is the current Vice President of the Commission, is therefore being put forward to serve another four year term. Although this would extend her membership of the Commission to 12 years this can be justified based on the above reasons and Miss Moore's experience as set out below. It will also mean that only three of the six Commissioners would be replaced at any one time in the future.
- 4.3 Miss Judith Moore is a Chartered Physiotherapist and worked as Academic Lead for Teaching and Learning with the Institute of Health and Social Care Studies. Miss Moore has also taught disaster preparedness activities in Sri Lanka and Dominica and been directly involved in supporting small projects undertaken in Sri Lanka. She has been a volunteer with St. John Ambulance for over 34 years and has used that experience to support her voluntary work overseas. Miss Moore's understanding of disaster preparedness and her educational background are invaluable to the Commissioners when evaluating educational projects and those focused on post-disaster or conflict rehabilitation.
- 4.4 Mrs McGuinness and Mr Pill were first appointed as Commissioners in June 2018 for a four year term. Their current terms of appointment also end on 31st July 2022. Each has indicated their willingness to serve a further four year term.

- 4.5 Mr Pill spent 12 years in education, including 4 years teaching in South India and several years working in Guernsey with the visually impaired following post graduate studies. Mr Pill worked for the overseas development charity, Mission Aviation Fellowship³ (“MAF”) for over 25 years, including 12 years as a bush pilot working in Tanzania, Uganda and Bangladesh and a further 10 years flying, supporting programmes in Chad, South Sudan, Ethiopia, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, South Africa and Uganda. This work involved flying in support of MAF’s responses to many emergencies and disasters, including civil conflict in Rwanda, Chad and South Sudan and the Ebola crisis in East Africa. Mr Pill’s extensive experience of development aid in Africa and Asia has proved invaluable to the Commission as his extensive first-hand experience means that he understands the challenges those delivering development aid face on a daily basis and has a sound understanding of the key requirements to achieve a successful and sustainable project.
- 4.6 Mrs McGuinness is the Water Quality Risk Manager with Guernsey Water. Prior to moving to Guernsey, Mrs McGuinness had worked in the water science industry for over 22 years including as Public Health Manager for Scottish Water. A post she had held for 10 years. Mrs McGuinness has a vast professional experience in and knowledge of public health matters, especially within the context of water and sanitation. Mrs McGuinness served as WaterAid Ambassador in Scotland for a number of years. This role involved her in funding raising for and promoting the work of WaterAid⁴. Each year, the Commission receives many applications from development aid charities for water and sanitation-linked projects. Mrs McGuinness’ experience in and understanding of these matters, particularly linked to her role with WaterAid, is of very great benefit to the Commission.
- 4.7 In recommending the appointment of Miss Moore, Mrs McGuinness and Mr Pill for a further four year term, the Commission is confident that they will undertake their responsibilities with enthusiasm and commitment to ensure that the funds the States

³ Mission Aviation Fellowship was founded in 1948 and is a charitable organisation which operates a fleet of 51 light aircraft from 17 bases in seven countries in Africa, Asia, Eurasia, and Latin America. Its pilots save valuable travel time and cover seemingly impossible distances in minutes or hours compared to days by foot, road, or river. Each year, MAF flies over two million nautical miles to speed the work of some 600 charitable and humanitarian organizations. MAF flights create access to medical care, provide disaster relief, and make community development projects possible in some of the most remote places on earth.

⁴ WaterAid is one of the UK’s largest development aid charities promoting access to clean, safe water. It has teams in 34 countries across the world, working with our partners to transform millions of lives every year by improving access to clean water, toilets and hygiene. Since 1981, WaterAid has provided clean water to nearly 25 million people.

provides for overseas development will continue to reach those in most need and make a sustainable improvement for their day-to-day lives.

5. Appointment of New Commissioners

- 5.1 In May 2022, the Commission advertised the three vacancies in the Guernsey Press and across the local media and social media. A copy of the advertisement and the information pack for applicants is set out in Appendix 1.
- 5.2. The Commission received 19 applications. The majority of the applications were very strong and many of the candidates had direct experience working or volunteering in the development aid field, including working overseas.
- 5.3 After careful consideration, the Commission shortlisted six candidates for interview. Sadly, one of the applicants who was interviewed and selected for one of the three posts, Mr. Michael Spiller, fell ill and had to withdraw from the appointment process. The Commission sends its best wishes to Mr Spiller and his family and wish him a speedy recovery.
- 5.4 The interview panel consisted of Deputy Le Tocq, representing the Policy & Resources Committee, and the President of the Commission, with the Principal Officer of the Commission providing support. Following the complete selection process it was unanimously agreed that Mr Christopher Gregg, Dr Lindsay Jefferies and Dr Michelle Le Cheminant should be presented to the States for appointment.
- 5.5 Mr Christopher Gregg is a Chartered Engineer and Chartered IT Professional. He grew up in Guernsey and worked for Guernsey Electricity whilst obtaining a Master of Electrical and Electronic Engineering from University of Surrey. He later obtained a Master of Business Administration from the University of Sunderland.
- 5.6 He has worked for the international charity Mercy Ships⁵ for over 22 years as an IT Manager, Project Engineer, Chief Information Officer, Managing Director of m/v Global Mercy (the world's largest non-governmental hospital ship), and currently is Senior Consultant to the Office of the Chief Operating Officer.
- 5.7 Mr Gregg and his wife, Vicki, initially spent four years as volunteers on a hospital ship working in West Africa, before transitioning to shore-based support work for Mercy Ships in the UK and USA. They returned to Guernsey in 2020 and he continues to work remotely for Mercy Ships in a management support role.

⁵Mercy Ships was formed in 1978 and is an international development organisation providing safe surgery to the developing world. The Mercy Ships fleet has visited more than 50 different developing nations, bringing hope and healing to more than 1.7 million of the world's poorest people. More than 1,000 volunteers from over 40 nations work on the frontline and behind the scenes to support the work of the ships.

- 5.8 It is considered that Mr. Gregg's extensive experience in senior management and operations in the international development sector, including a background in business strategy, project management and practical engineering, will be invaluable to the Commission.
- 5.9 Dr Lindsay Jefferies is the Managing Director of Island Global Research Ltd. She has a PhD in Health Economics, a Masters in Business Administration (MBA), a MA in European Political Economy and a BA (Hons) in Economics and Econometrics. Before moving to Guernsey in 2015 she spent 15 years working in international development both in policy and research roles.
- 5.10 During her career, Dr Jefferies worked as an Economist at the United Kingdom Department for International Development (DIFD). Her roles included advising the UK Director of the European Bank for Reconstruction and Developments on grant and loan applications. She also spent three years in the Malawi country office, based in Lilongwe, where she had oversight of a £20 million budget support grant and provided economic advice to colleagues managing health, education, private sector and governance programmes.
- 5.11 Dr Jefferies then transitioned to academia. She worked briefly as a Researcher in Health Economics at Oxford University, and then joined the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, achieving the position of Assistant Professor in Health Economics in the Department for Global Health and Development. Dr Jefferies (nee Mangham) has published academic papers on a range of topics, such as the shortage of health workers in sub-Saharan Africa, inequalities in health care seeking, improving malaria diagnosis and treatment, the cost-effectiveness of maternal and newborn health initiatives, and the evaluation of complex behaviour change interventions - all in the developing world.
- 5.12 Dr Jefferies' wide experience on programme implementation and evaluation, understanding the principles and goals of sustainable development, appreciation of in-country political and cultural context, governance and practical considerations for providing effective development assistance, reviewing of grant and loan applications; and understanding of medicine / health systems, will bring key knowledge and skills to the Commission.
- 5.13 Dr Michelle Le Cheminant is a Consultant Anaesthetist based at the Medical Specialist Group LLP. She attended Cambridge University and returned to the Island 3 years ago after completing her medical training in the UK.

- 5.14 Throughout her career Dr Le Cheminant has been committed to improving healthcare services in low and middle income countries through education and training. In 2017 she spent six months as a Visiting Lecturer at the University Teaching Hospital of Lusaka, volunteering with the Zambia Anaesthetic Development Project, as well as working with local teams to deliver rural outreach projects. During this time she had hands on experience of the challenges of teaching and training in the developing world.
- 5.15 Since 2017, Dr Le Cheminant has been a volunteer faculty anaesthetist with the eye care charity Orbis International⁶ joining their Flying Eye Hospital on projects in Vietnam, China and Mongolia. In 2018, she undertook an anaesthetic service evaluation on behalf of Orbis at a hospital in Malawi to guide procurement and aid planning for future training projects. She has also supported Orbis International in its fundraising efforts and helped develop an ambitious e-learning curriculum on the Orbis Cybersight website.
- 5.16 Dr Le Cheminant’s medical expertise and her experience of working and teaching in the developing world will be of great benefit to the Commission particularly as it receives many applications from development aid charities for healthcare and education projects.

6. Recommendation

- 6.1 The reappointment of Miss Moore, Mrs McGuinness and Mr Pill, and the appointment of Mr Gregg, Dr Jefferies and Dr Le Cheminant, as Commissioners of the Overseas Aid and Development Commission, is commended to the States.

7. Compliance with Rule 4

- 7.1 Rule 4 of the Rules of Procedure of the States of Deliberation and their Committees sets out the information which must be included in, or appended to, motions laid before the States.
- 7.2 In accordance with Rule 4(1): a) the proposition contributes to the States’ objectives and policy plans by ensuring the Commission has a full complement of Commissioners to fulfil its Constitution; b) in preparing the proposition consultation has been undertaken with the Policy & Resources Committee c) the proposition has been submitted to Her Majesty’s Procureur for advice on any legal or constitutional

⁶Orbis International was founded in 1982 and is a global charity dedicated to transforming lives through the prevention and treatment of blindness. It works alongside eye teams in communities to provide training and guidance to leave a long-term eye care legacy. In 2020 alone, it undertook 3.4 million examinations, provided training to more than 29,000 eye care professionals and worked on 61 projects across fourteen countries.

implications; d) there are no financial implications to the States of carrying the proposal into effect.

Vacancies for Three Commissioners

*Are you looking to play an active part in your community?
Do you take an active interest in third world issues and development aid?
Are you able to evaluate grant requests to make balanced and fair decisions?*

Introduction

The Overseas Aid & Development Commission (the Commission) is inviting applications for Islanders interested in serving as Commissioners. The Commission will have three vacancies from August 2022 following the end of the terms of three Commissioners.

Appointment to the Commission is made by the States of Deliberation on the recommendation of the Commission and is for a four year term (but with the possibility of serving another term). This is an unpaid role but one which is both interesting and rewarding and provides an opportunity to make decisions that will have a real and enduring impact on the lives of some of the world's poorest communities.

The Commissioners' role is to apply their experience of development aid and professional knowledge to help ensure that the annual grant the Commission receives from the States (£3.18 million for 2022) is used to support projects that will offer a sustainable improvement of the basic needs of those living in poverty in the world's least developed countries.

The Role of Commissioner

The role of Commissioner includes doing preparatory work in advance of meetings by reading the papers provided, undertaking any research they consider necessary, and taking an active part in the deliberations and decision-making. **The role is unpaid and does not involve overseas travel.**

The Commission meets regularly (typically once a month), generally on Wednesday afternoons (typically between 4.00pm and 6.00pm). These meetings include:

- Five or six funding meetings (generally held between April and July) to consider applications for charities for grant aid awards;
- Ad hoc meetings to consider requests for disaster and emergency relief awards in response to natural disasters or humanitarian crisis;

- Meetings with local organisations seeking matched funding from the Commission to support development aid projects;
- Meeting/s to review and approve the Commission's annual report
- Ad hoc meetings with representatives of development aid charities to hear about the progress of supported projects and their plans for future work.

Commissioners are required to review and evaluate applications for funding against the Commission's published funding criteria. This includes reading and assessing the applications prior to a meeting and then, during the meeting, discussing the merits of the applications with the other Commissioners and reaching agreement whether or not to support a particular request for funding. Each year the Commission receives around 200 individual applications for grant aid funding and these are considered in batches of between 50 and 60 applications per funding meeting. In addition, the Commission receives around 10 to 15 emergency and disaster relief requests, and up to 10 community partnership funding requests, and there also are a small number of meetings with charities.

The majority of the Commissioners' work is undertaken at home reading and assessing the many applications for funding, reading the project reports submitted by the charities that receive funding from the Commission and generally keeping themselves abreast of matters relating to development aid.

This is a real opportunity to contribute positively not only to our local community but also to improve the lives of some of the world's poorest communities. As well as considering applications, the Commissioners will also have the opportunity to consider and support new overseas aid initiatives. This includes providing guidance and putting forward ideas based on their own knowledge of least developed countries and development aid, as well as their professional expertise.

This is an interesting and exciting role for any local residents with an active interest in third world issues, especially development aid. The current Commissioners bring a large range of skills to the Commission's work including direct experience of working in a least developed country, professional experience in medicine, water, tertiary and health education and legal matters, active participation with an established development aid charity and expertise in project management and good governance.

The Commission would be particularly interested in applications from local residents with development aid experience in one or more the following areas:

- Medicine
- Education, especially within primary or secondary schools
- Micro-finance and community savings programmes
- Engineering, especially in relation to solar power and hydrology
- Climate change and mitigation of its impact;
- Legal matters

Life as a Commissioner

To assist you in deciding whether this may be a role for you, the current Commissioners have this to say about the Commission's work and their role:

Judy Moore (Vice President), a qualified physiotherapist and former Academic Lead for Teaching and Learning at the Institute for Health and Social Care Studies, says,

"Having worked on Overseas Aid Projects in Sri Lanka and Dominica, I feel that being a Commissioner has enabled me to use my experience to guide the decisions made in relation to the distribution of Guernsey's aid budget on behalf of the Island population. When I was first interviewed for the role I suggested that 'cynicism and realism' would be valuable assets and I still feel these are still essential qualities to be able to judge one apparently worthwhile project against another. Opportunities to discuss projects with my fellow Commissioners and to meet representatives of local and national charities, combined with research into the areas we have been asked to support, have enabled me to develop my understanding of the needs and priorities of communities less fortunate than ourselves. It has been a privilege to contribute towards improving the lives of people in some of the least developed counties in the world."

Dr Nick Paluch, a retired GP, was appointed to the Commission in 2012 and has made the following reflections on his time as a Commissioner,

"For me the role of Commissioner is an immensely satisfying way to put my knowledge and experience to good use for the benefit of others. At the end of the funding round it is great to know that I have played my part in ensuring that the Overseas Aid budget has been allocated as fairly and as conscientiously as possible. It is even more rewarding to know what a huge difference the grants will make to the lives of individuals and communities all around the world."

I have also been fortunate enough to visit several Guernsey funded projects whilst travelling in Africa and SE Asia. I have done this at my own expense but it has given me a great insight into and appreciation of the work done by the Commission".

Philip Bodman, Chief Operating Officer in a local financial services company says,

"I have had a long-standing interest in overseas aid matters, particularly having spent ten years working in the developing world before I returned to Guernsey,

I was very pleased to be invited to serve on the Overseas Aid Commission in 2012 and to help make best use of the Guernsey taxpayers' money in improving the lives of those less fortunate than ourselves. Since then I have seen what an impact our limited resources can have in transforming lives and opportunities for those with very little. Guernsey can be very proud that it looks beyond its shores and seeks to help

others. It makes a tangible difference in many communities and rightly raises our profile and standing nationally and internationally. There is always more to be done but it is right that our government has decided to maintain this commitment to the wider world.

I am continually impressed by the depth of knowledge and experience of my fellow Commissioners and the passion they demonstrate to ensure that every pound makes a difference.”

Bryan Pill, former Mission Aviation Fellowship pilot for many years, says,

“One of the delights of this role has been how enjoyable it has been working with such a great team, under excellent leadership. Everyone brings something different to the table, all are heard, united by a common purpose to make the most of the resources we have been given.”
