THE GUERNSEY YOUNG PEOPLE'S SURVEY 2022

RESULTS



The Guernsey Young People's survey has been undertaken since the early 1990's and is the key evidence base for the collation of the views, attitudes and health behaviours of young people in the Bailiwick of Guernsey. It has a dedicated website page:

Each school that completes the survey receives a report of its students' responses. The report highlights their responses according to the four headings: Healthy and Active; Reaching Potential; Safe and Nurtured; Included and Respected.

It also compares with other Bailiwick schools and with the results from the previous Guernsey Young People's survey

The survey is administered by the Schools Health Education Unit. The unit are leaders in gathering evidence about the behaviour, views and attitudes of young people. A team of local experts have reviewed and updated the questions in the survey to ensure that they are relevant and appropriate. The local experts will also comment upon the findings in the autumn.

80+ questions were asked to 1,458 Young People (527 in Year 6, 330 in Year 8, and 456 in Year 10) about aspects of their lives shaped around the priorities of the Children and Young People's Plan.

Topic areas include: Drugs; Alcohol; Tobacco; Sex and Relationships; Sport and physical activity participation; Food and Health; Emotional Health.


The survey asked questions which reflected the four priority outcomes of the Children and Young People's Plan. The survey also included a few questions that seek to find out young people's views on education.

Additional Questions for 2022: Following advice from the local experts and consultation with headteachers there are additional questions in the 2022 survey.


- Questions about the impact of Covid

- Questions on experience of discrimination




PERCENTAGE OF STUDENTS WHO LIVE WITH THEIR MOTHER AND FATHER






















There has been a concerted efforts by many schools to encourage active travel over the past few years.

















Following the capture of Children and Young People's voice, Education will continue to work across multi-agency / organisational responsibilities to meet the needs of all children.
