1.1 Introduction

The Labour Market Bulletin provides a quarterly snapshot of the Guernsey labour market using claimant and contribution data provided by the States of Guernsey Social Security Department.

1.2 Headlines


- At the end of December 2011, there were 32,182 employed and self-employed people in Guernsey, 62 people or 0.2% less than at the same time the previous year.
- There were 29,181 people employed at the end of December 2011 (0.1% more than in December 2010) and 3,001 people self employed (3.3% less than in December 2010).
- The number of people registered unemployed (using the International Labour Office (ILO) definition of unemployment) at the end of December 2011 was 367 representing 1.1% of the workforce.
- There were 2,263 employing organisations in Guernsey at the end of December 2011, 17 less than in December 2010.
- Total employment in the finance sector (Guernsey's largest employing sector) increased by 0.5% in the year ending December 2011, the number of people employed or self employed in this sector increasing to 6,852.

Figure 1.3.1: Employment



Employed people are classified by the Social Security Department as those who work for wages or a salary under a contract of service. Self employed people are those who are in business for themselves, not under the control of an employer.

Total employment is calculated by adding the number of employed persons to the number of self employed people.

In the year ending December 2011 the number of people in employment decreased by 62 (0.2%) to 32,182 (see *table 2.1.1* and *figure 2.1.1*).

In total, over the ten years ending December 2011, there has been a cumulative increase of 1,349 (4.4%) in the number of people in employment.

Total employment in Guernsey shows seasonal variations as certain sectors (eg hostelry and horticulture) employ more people during the summer than in the winter. As a result of this, total employment in Guernsey is typically higher in the second and third quarters (ending September and December) than in the first and fourth quarters (ending March and December).

The seasonally adjusted trend shown graphically in *figure 1.3.1* indicates that total employment levels were declining during the second half of 2011. The trend is calculated using the Census X-12 method, which was developed by the US Census Bureau.

The number of employees (i.e. working for an employer) is subject to the seasonal variations described on the previous page. The number of self employed people does not show regular seasonal increases and decreases to the same extent as the number of employees.

At the end of December 2011, there were 29,181 employees in Guernsey, an increase of 39 (or 0.1%) since December 2010 (see *table 3.1.1* and *figure 3.1.1*).


There were 3,001 self employed people at the end of December 2011, 101 (3.3%) less than the previous year. Self employed people accounted for 9.3% of the total workforce, the lowest proportion of self employed people since 1995.

In December 2011, there were 14,820 women in employment, 49 (or 0.3%) more than in December 2010 (see *table 3.2.1* and *figure 3.2.1*). By contrast the number of men in employment decreased by 111 (0.6%) in the year ending December 2011 to 17,362.


The proportion of the workforce comprised of women was 46.1% at the end of December 2011, 0.2 percentage points more than in December 2010.

Figure 3.1.1: Annual percentage change in employees and self employed










Figure 3.3.1: Employment by economic sector at December each year

Employers and employees can be analysed by economic sector for a more detailed picture of the types of economic activity in which they are involved. A breakdown of the activities included in each of the economic sector codes used in this bulletin can be found on our website *www.gov.gg/ecodes*.

As show in *figure 3.3.1* and *table 3.4.1*, the largest proportion (21.3%) of people in employment in Guernsey worked in the finance sector in December 2011. In the year ending December 2011 the number of people working in the finance sector increased by 35 (0.5%).

The sector which showed the largest annual percentage change in the number of employed and self employed people was the real estate activities sector which increased by 14.5% to 237 people in December 2011.


The construction sector had the largest number self employed people in December 2011 (837 or 27.2% of the total number of people employed in that sector), representing 27.8% of all self employed people. The other service activities sector had the highest proportion of self employment with 33.0% of workers in the sector being self employed (see *table 3.4.1* and *figure 3.4.1*).



4.1 Employers by size



At the end of December 2011, there were 2,263 employers in Guernsey, 17 (0.7%) fewer than the previous year (see *figure 4.1.1* and *table 4.1.1*).

There were seven organisations employing 250 or more people in December 2011, one more than in December 2010.

Of the 19 sectors, seven showed an increase in employers over the year ending December 2011, four showed no change and eight decreased (see *table 4.2.1*). Please note that some of the percentage changes are based on small numbers and can therefore seem large relative to the actual change in numbers.

Of the organisations which employed more than 50 people, 36 (30.8%) were in the finance sector at the end of December 2011.



Figure 4.2.1: Employers by economic sector at December each year





As show in *table 5.1.1*, there were 367 people registered as unemployed using the International Labour Office definitions of unemployment¹ in December 2011, 91 people more than in December the previous year.

The registered unemployment rate using the ILO definition was 1.1% at the end of December 2011, 0.3 percentage points higher than in December 2010 (see *figure 5.1.1*).

The "total registered unemployed" measure (which was the previous headline measure) includes those on government training schemes for the unemployed (such as the Community and Environmental Projects Scheme) or anybody in part time or casual employment who is available to work additional hours but still eligible to claim job seekers benefit to supplement their income.

The rate of unemployment using the total registered unemployed measure was 1.6% at the end of December 2011, 0.3 percentage points higher than in December 2010.

Figure 5.1.2 shows the composition of total registered unemployment (i.e ILO unemployment plus claimants in part-time or casual employment or participating in a training scheme but still eligible for jobseekers benefits).

At the end of December 2011 there were 122 claimants participating in part time or casual work, three more than in December 2010. There were also 20 claimants participating in government training schemes in December 2011, five less than at the same time the previous year.

5.2 Unemployment in detail

The number of men unemployed (by ILO definitions) in December 2011 was greater than the number of women registered unemployed in all age categories (see *figure 3.2.1*). Of the those registered unemployed using the ILO definitions, 32% were women and 68% were men.

Typically, the age distribution of registered unemployment among women is more even than among men. The higher level of unemployment in the younger age categories in particular is more pronounced in men then in women.

The age group with the highest number of registered unemployed men was the 20-29 category accounting for 29% of unemployed men and 20% of the total number of unemployed (by ILO definitions).

The age group with the most unemployed women in December 2011 was also 20-29, in which there were 24 people who were registered as unemployed using the ILO definition.

The 60-65 age group had the least number of unemployed for both men and women.

Of the registered unemployed who called into SSD in the snapshot week at the end of December, 45% had been registered unemployed for less than three months at that time (see *figure 5.2.1*). 20% of claimants had been registered unemployed for more than a year (see *figure 5.2.2*).

Figure 5.2.1: Unemployment by age and gender in December 2011







Figure 5.2.3: Number of vacancies placed with the job centre each month

Claimants who had been registered for more than a year comprised 20% of the total.

Figure 5.2.3 shows the number of vacancies placed with the Guernsey job centre each month. Although this is not a complete representation of the total number of vacancies in the Island, it does provide an indication of the strength of the employment market.
