The Careers Service is now an all-age service known as Careers Guernsey, operating within the States of Guernsey Education Services. The services are available to everybody in the Bailiwick of Guernsey free of charge and provided in an impartial and confidential way.

The aims of Careers Guernsey are to:

- Raise aspirations
- Raise awareness of the labour market
- Improve self-awareness
- Support progression and sustainable destinations
- Develop effective lifelong career management skills

We support people in the following ways:

Self-help

<u>www.careers.gg</u> helps support people to become effective career planners. The website has been redesigned to encourage users to develop effective career planning skills.

Supported

Helps people with their career planning, opportunity awareness and career management through face to face and e-support as well as working in partnership across an IAG (Information, Advice and Guidance) network.

Intensive support

Helps people that are not in education, employment or training (NEET) and those who are at risk of not participating. This individual support is likely to be over a period of time and as part of a multi-agency approach.

Careers Guernsey Delivery in Schools/Post-16

Each School/Post-16 provider has a Partnership Agreement with Careers Guernsey to support them. A professionally trained Careers Adviser is linked to each School/Post-16.

Primary Yr 6 Careers Guernsey run a primary project with Year 6 focusing on aspirations, expectations, skills and attitudes. The sessions include fun and engaging activities including Superhero Me, No such thing as boys or girls jobs, Skills for work and my future, Jobs where I live and Mystery Guest.

Years 9 & 10 Careers support is provided to students through their Careers Education lessons at school.

This helps them with choices and awareness of options as well as understanding more about their skills. Initiatives such as Raising Aspirations events can also be delivered.

Year 11's Careers advice and guidance is through individual interviews or through group work sessions about options and how to make choices about their careers. An action plan is usually agreed between the student and Careers Adviser about the best way forward. The guidance is student-centred and impartial which is important for the student so that they take part in the decision-making process that is realistic and appropriate to their plans and ideas.

Post-16 Careers advice and guidance is also available to students who have decided to continue in post-16 education either as one to one interviews or groupwork sessions. Initiatives such as Raising Aspirations events can also be delivered.

Parents Careers Advisers usually attend parent's evenings for Year 9, Year 11 and Post-16 students to ensure parents are up to date with their son/daughter's options and choices. A parents' guide about options after Yr 11 is also produced by Careers Guernsey each year and available on www.careers.gg

Various careers events are organised by Careers Guernsey including the Careers Show www.careersshow.gg and Higher Education events, usually in March/April each year. Information is available on www.careers.gg

Agency Careers Guernsey works closely with other agencies that support young people. **Liaison** These include School Attendance Service, Education Psychology, Youth Justice, Health and

Social Care, Youth Partnership and Action for Children.

Website www.careers.gg provides information for students, parents, teachers and employers about choices at 16 and 18, work experience, job vacancies, qualifications and much more.

If staff in school feel they need to update themselves about the options available for students they can contact the Careers Adviser for their school. Sean Parry is the Careers Adviser working in schools and post-16 sean.parry@gov.gg T: 733044.

Young people can also see a Careers Adviser whenever they want to, including school holidays. Parents are also welcome to come along.



Guernsey Work Experience: Guernsey Work Experience Programme

Work experience is an important part of learning for all Guernsey students.

Every year GWEx places over 1200 students mostly from year 10, 11 and Post-16 on work experience giving them the chance of experiencing the world of work and finding out for themselves how their key skills are relevant and can be applied in the workplace.

Work experience could not exist without Guernsey's supportive employers and our database now has over 1000 places of work for our students to choose from.

Students can access the GWEx database via the website at any time by going onto WEXBOX at www.careers.gg which is updated weekly with more employers who are joining with Education to offer work experience to students, providing an even greater choice of placements. GWEx provides a health and safety check on every employer and a job description is written for every available job. GWEx's aim is to make every work experience fulfilling and relevant but above all, safe for the student to participate in. Student and employer feedback forms help us ensure standards for work experience are met.

The Youth Commission has staff allocated to work with High Schools, special schools and CFE, who are able to deliver a range of planned non-formal education programmes and activities and/or offer support to teachers providing such programmes.

Agencies School Engagement Team

(ASET)

A multiagency team specifically for children & young persons with SEBD



ASET is a self-determining group who have developed a common framework to use in interventions for young people with Social, Emotional and Behavioural Difficulties (SEBD) and their families. The group offer signposting, advice, guidance and support to each other and outside agencies and the families and young people with whom they work.

The team of practitioners meet weekly to discuss, assess and review individual cases of young people across the Bailiwick who have SEBD. Responses to individual young people is on a case-by-case basis to support the young person and/or their family/carers.

Helping support initiatives to improve literacy and numeracy skills in the Bailiwick

ECOP's primary purpose is to support initiatives that tackle the widening gap between the highest and lowest achievers in society and to cultivate a culture whereby the Guernsey community collectively takes responsibility for the education of its children. The charity is a collaboration between the business sector, the States and schools who work together to provide focussed help for those children that need it the most.

Research clearly demonstrates that children from more socially deprived backgrounds are far more likely to fall below their peers in literacy and numeracy at Key Stages 1 and 2. ECOF aims to facilitate the strategic support needed by these children and their families to enable them to overcome their initial poor progress and keep up with their wealthier peers.

HOW THIS IS ACHIEVED SO FAR

- Business donations from CSR help fund training for island teaching staff in early intervention programmes that help with literacy, numeracy and communication targetted specifically at those children that need extra help
- One teacher trainer and ten individual teachers have been specially trained in the highly effective intervention strategy of Reading Recovery
- Business volunteers donate man-hours in schools providing positive adult role models for reading and allowing children to practice their skills with a fully trained adult.

ECOF will continue to provide help to children most in need in terms of school achievment in order to raise attainment levels in Guernsey. Our underlying principle remains that help given at the earliest age possible is the most effective, both financially and in terms of improving the life choices available to these children.

1) Visiting the Museums

Is it free?

Yes. Bailiwick school groups to Guernsey Museums are all free of charge. Guernsey Museums are:

- Castle Cornet
- Guernsey Museum & Art Gallery in Candie Gardens
- Fort Grey Shipwreck Museum

Teaching staff – including teaching assistants – can also visit the Museums anytime for free with their *Education Pass* (please get in touch if you don't have one).

Do I need to book my visit or can I just turn up?

Please book all Education visits – including independent ones – through the Access & Learning Manager (Jo Dowding). She will advise you on the most suitable venue and explain what the Museum Education Service can offer.

Do I lead the visit or does someone from the Museum do it?

It's up to you. The most popular sessions led by Museum staff are:

- Pre History, Iron Age and Celts
- Romans in Guernsey
- Medieval
- Castles
- Tudor Life
- Old Toys
- Victorians

Please bear in mind that we respond to demand. Some of the recent tailor-made sessions include:

- What was the most remarkable decade of the 20th Century?
- Make Do & Mend
- Victorian Children
- Fraud in Art

Do I have to visit the Museum before I come with my class?

We strongly recommend that you do. You can familiarise yourself with the layout and plan questions, activities or worksheets, if you wish.

How long does a visit last?

It can last as long as you want. Call Jo to discuss options.

How many adults do I have to bring with me?

The minimum ratio of adults to children that we recommend is:

- 1:10 for Key Stage 1
- 1:15 for Key Stage 2 and 3

For outside activities we recommend 1:7.

Are there worksheets available for my visit?

Yes, we have a variety of activity sheets. Please contact Jo. You are also welcome to make your own. If you wish the Museum to supply clipboards and pencils, please arrange in advance.

What about behaviour?

Teaching staff are expected to manage behaviour during all trips, including guided tours and handling sessions. Members of the Museum staff will intervene if they feel it is necessary.

What about risk assessments?

These are available from Jo.

What about if I want to visit another non-paying site, like Vale Castle or Déhus Dolmen?

Great! Guernsey Museums manage over 70 historic sites and they can inspire many learning opportunities. These venues do not need to be booked beforehand but if you let Jo know, she can ensure the place is tidy before you arrive. Please ensure that students visiting any outdoor Historic sites have suitable shoes and outerwear.

2) Museums visiting you

I don't have any time to visit the Museum. Can someone from the Museum visit me?

We encourage teaching staff to visit the Museums but understand this is not always possible. Depending on time and availability, Jo may be able to hold a session in class.

Can I have people coming into school dressed in costume talking about history?

Yes. The Museum works closely with the Guernsey History In Action Company which has a broad selection of performances suitable for children and young adults. Please book these through Jo. The most popular with schools are:

Pirates & Privateers

A Letter of Marque gave Channel Island seamen a legitimate claim on the bounty from enemy ships. Pirate 'Dangerous Brian' thinks this is one for him!

- All Hands on Deck

A story of ill-manned ships, disease and determination. In the 1740s Guernseyman Philip Saumarez sailed with Commodore Anson on his round-the-world voyage in pursuit of enemy ships.

- A Narrow Escape

In 1794 Sir James Saumarez escaped a superior French Squadron off the west coast of Guernsey with the help of Guernseyman Jean Breton. The audience is enlisted to help re-enact the scene.

- Cholera Story of 1832 (recommended for Year 5 and over)

Rich or poor, no-one was spared this deadly disease. Gravedigger Samuel Boucher relives the three weeks of terror with the help of two local ladies.

- Mr Victor Hugo

A lively introduction to the man, his time and his works. This includes an interactive retelling of part of Hugo's novel 'The Toilers of the Sea'.

- Enne Bouanne Craquerie

Listen Marguerite and Olive chat about their days growing up in Guernsey during the Occupation. They both grew up speaking their local language Giérnesiais (Norman French) and they might speak a bit for you.

Can I borrow things from the Museum?

Yes. We offer artefact boxes and the most popular are:

- Roman
- Tudor
- Victorian
- 1940s /Occupation
- 1960s/70s/80s
- Toys
- Homes
- Seaside

We can also make boxes to order; please enquire.

What about art resources?

We have an extensive collection of paintings from 18th century to the present day by local and visiting artists. Most of the collection is digitised and CDs with selected works by artist or by subject (eg Peter Le Lievre or 'The Sea') can be borrowed with at least 3 weeks advance notice. We also have prints of some of the works for sale or loan.







The Priaulx Library - Local Studies made easy

Who we are

The Priaulx Library is a centre of excellence for local studies. We have large collections of local material including books, journals, magazines, newspapers, photographs, prints, drawings and maps – all contemporary as well as historical. We also have specialist military and rare book collections, and other information which has assisted both University and Sixth Form students with their theses and examinations and Primary School students with their projects.

What we do

The Priaulx Library is happy to help in any way with the local studies needs of schools. We can provide tours of the building, with its lovely preserved Victorian interior, as well as provide sessions on specific aspects of local life. We have done useful work with several schools, including work on local maps and map-making, the German Occupation, and, of course, Victorians. We are also used regularly as a venue for activities week.

School Visits

The librarians are happy to visit schools with prepared material, or to provide advice in finding local resources for children and teachers. Work was done with St. Martin's Year 6 in helping the children research their projects on the Victorians.

Work with Teachers

The librarians are available to provide guided tours and introductions to resources at most times, including evenings with prior arrangement. The research assistants can also help in compiling resources for specific projects – for example, copying newspaper articles to assist in the Vauvert Primary School centenary celebrations. As the library owns the majority of its collections, there are few problems with copyright issues.

The Guernsey Sports Commission (GSC) is a charitable organisation set up in 2004 that aims to make a difference in Guernsey by helping to provide opportunity in sport and physical activity for everyone. Our offices are situated in the Coach House next to Beau Sejour Leisure Centre.

Programmes for School Age Children

PE in Schools: Each participating schools receive 15 weeks of high quality PE in the school year, taught over 5 week termly blocks. Each term focuses on a key area of the PE Curriculum, Invasion Games, Net and Wall Games and Striking and Fielding. The aim of these lessons is to up skill teachers, engage the children, develop their key skills and inspire them to continue playing sport into later life. The programme includes: Playground Sports Leaders, Reception Lessons, Teacher Training, Fit Clubs and Coaching Assistants are now delivered along with the PE in Schools.

On Your Marks: Run in school holidays offering a range of sports and physical activities for 4-16 year olds for £1 per session. Including Fun and Fit Club and Multisports for Primary School aged children and single sports sessions for children in Year 6 and secondary school.

Street Sports: A free community programme offering evening sport sessions for young people, held three nights a week at two local estates.

Youth Games: The games are open to Years 5 and 6 of the local primary schools, the principle aim of the Games is to promote the value of sport to the young people of Guernsey with an emphasis on fun, fair play and the creation of a festival atmosphere. The Games are held bi-annually with the next Games being held in 2017.

The ChildLine Schools Service

The ChildLine Schools Service will focus on primary school children from Key Stage 2 particularly year 5 and 6 pupils, 9-11 year olds. Our aim is to start a societal change that will bring about a long term reduction in child cruelty.

Our main objectives are outlined below;

- To ensure children have an understanding of abuse in all its forms, including bullying and an ability to recognise the signs of abuse.
- To ensure children know how to protect themselves from all forms of abuse.
- To make them aware of how to get help and sources of help (including ChildLine).

How is this achieved?

The schools programme is initially aimed at Year 5 and Year 6 pupils and consists of an assembly style presentation (lasting 45-50 minutes) followed by workshops in individual classes (lasting approximately 1hr and 15mins). The materials have been developed to ensure age appropriateness and are delivered with respect and sensitivity for the children. Accompanying materials are also provided to reinforce learning.

The assembly style **presentation** to the whole year group(s) includes information about ChildLine, an introduction to the subject of abuse covering physical abuse, sexual abuse, emotional abuse, neglect and bullying. Signposting a range of sources of help and support, reinforcing the message that children have the right to be safe, happy and to be listened to. After the visit, pupils are provided with an activities booklet containing a crossword, word search and acrostic activities which reinforce the key messages from the presentation.

The **workshop** is delivered to individual classes approximately 2 weeks after the presentation and includes: a recap on the learning from the presentation, small group activity based on 'good touching and wrong touching' discussion of a case study involving neglect and creating a buddy kit.

After the workshop pupils are provided with a finger flexor to reinforce learning in a fun and colourful way.

Education Programme

The drug education programme covers years 7 to 13 with each session developing from the previous session(s).

Aims and objectives include:

- Dispelling the myths associated with drug misuse and providing sound factual information
- Encouraging consequential thinking in the context of decision making
- A focus on health, social and legal implications of drug use

What do we do?

In a nutshell we aim to help resolve any accommodation related problems that young people between the ages of 16 to 25 years may be experiencing now, or might encounter in the future.

When are we available?

We are open Monday to Friday between 9am and 5pm but are closed to the public on Wednesday mornings for team meetings. We can be contacted to arrange appointments outside these hours if necessary.

Where are we based?

Our office is across from St James Hall, the first building up from the new court buildings.

How can we help?

Action for Children feels it can support the curriculum by passing on the following information:

- 1. Raising awareness as to the risks of youth homelessness
- 2. First-hand experience of dealing with young people in difficult situations
- 3. Knowledge that there is no simple cure for these problems but we are able to give practical advice and information

We have devised lessons for Year 10 (although these can be adapted for any age, as required) to show this and to make people aware of who we are and where to get help. We hope that the learning outcomes that arise from the input into schools will be:

- 1. Realities to show what really has happened to young people rights & responsibilities
- 2. Where to go for help how to contact Action for Children
- 3. What can be expected what services do Action for Children provide
- 4. Reasons for leaving home discuss and/or give scenarios
- 5. What is homelessness? dispel myths and consider degrees of homelessness
- 6. Problems associated with homelessness to emphasise the vulnerability of young people when they leave home for the first time

Alcohol Education for Years 5 & 6

Action for Children is offering Alcohol Education lessons to all Year 5 & 6 classes. This is in response to local research that suggested that children of these ages want to know more about the subject of alcohol.

At Action for Children we have first-hand experience of young people whose lives have been affected by alcohol misuse. We are offering alcohol education in primary schools in order to reach children before problems occur and inappropriate alcohol use begins. Educating children about alcohol before attitudes and behaviour are formalised will help to encourage them to make healthy and safe choices in the future.

The aims of the lessons in Year 5 are to increase children's awareness

- of drinks consumed in our society and how alcohol is different from non-alcoholic drinks
- of the effects and risks of drinking alcohol
- that alcohol is measured in units and that some drinks are stronger than others
- that alcohol affects different people differently
- that alcohol can be used safely and responsibly, but that it can have very damaging effects if misused

The aims of the lessons in Year 6 are

- for children to consider situations in which drinking alcohol could be dangerous
- to provide an opportunity to consider reasons why people might choose to drink or not drink alcohol
- to focus on decision making skills about the use of alcohol and to practise refusal skills

We are offering one lesson per year per class. The lessons fit into the PSHE Scheme of Work: Developing a Healthy, Safer Lifestyle and will last approximately one hour.

Action for Children offer a range of lessons intending to cover all ages from year 7 through to year 13. The topic is, of course, always alcohol but the focus of each lesson changes slightly in accordance to the age catered for.

The focus for each age group is as follows:

- Yr 7 The Stages of Intoxication and the effects on the body and society.
- Yr 8 Impact of alcohol on relationships/society and considering staying safe.

 Male Vs Female limitations and body compositions
- Yr 9 Drink driving- responsibilities as well as Statistics accidents and blood alcohol concentration
- Yr 10 Actions and consequence. Taking responsibility for your own and others' safety. How alcohol affects the human body weight gain / sexual behaviour / fetal alcohol spectrum disorders/ the adolescent brain.
- Yr 11 The bigger picture. Looking at alcohol laws, policy and ethics. Putting our knowledge into practice. The Lancet Study Drugs Vs Alcohol
- Yr 12 The role media plays regarding alcohol (Advertising, Branding, Role Models, and Government) Considering why we drink.
- Yr 13 Employment, independent living and university life

The concept is that the knowledge-base for the students will develop through their school life, hopefully covering all aspects of alcohol education.

Whilst the lessons follow the above structure, if any tutor/teacher felt there was a particular issue in their school/tutor group/year/class which needed addressing then feel free to contact Action for Children (700218) to arrange special sessions or tailored lessons.

As well as the formal lessons, a great deal of contact with young people is done through informal education and outreach work. This may take the form of event organising or facilitating, helping out with regular sessions or clubs or just 'cold calling' street work. If you feel there are any opportunities to support your school in addition to the formal lessons then please contact Action for Children.

Health Information Guernsey

Health Information Guernsey is a charity, which provides information on all aspects of health and disabilities by encouraging awareness, sensitivity and consideration of people in general and not isolating those with disabilities.

Motivating a 'mind change' in attitudes at an early age can be extremely useful.

We stress that people with physical, emotional or sensory disabilities have 'equal rights' and most of the problems which affect them, such as access and relationships with other people are common to all members of society.

Our work with schools is designed to promote the awareness of the ways in which these disabilities can affect activities of daily living. In our citizenship lessons we encourage the classes to think about their relationship with, and attitudes to people who have disabilities. How they react to them and ways which they can be of help.

We also encourage the children to think about disabilities which are not immediately apparent and discuss attitudes and awareness of ways in which sensory and physical disabilities can be restricting.

A new initiative is that of highlighting the circumstances of 'Young Carers'. We have a range of lessons planned for all year groups and we work closely with the Princess Royal Trust in promoting understanding and support for children in this situation.

The St John Schools' Liaison Group comprises of approximately 10 Emergency Medical Technicians and Paramedics and is overseen by the Services' Schools Liaison Officer. The aims of the group are to promote the Ambulance Service to Primary School children (Reception, Year 1 or Year 2) in a positive manner, and in doing so, hopefully overcome any fears of travelling in an ambulance or being treated by ambulance staff. A lesson 'Beach Safety' is also offered to Year 9 pupils in Secondary Schools.

During the Primary School session the pupils will have the opportunity to look inside an ambulance with a brief explanation of the equipment carried and what it is used for. The children will be able to touch and hold the equipment as appropriate, as being familiar with our equipment and how it is used will help to make them more relaxed if they should ever need an ambulance journey.

Pupils will also have the opportunity to make a '999' call on a specially adapted phone, and experience the type of questions they may be asked in an emergency situation, by a call taker at the Joint Emergency Services Control Centre. There will also be an opportunity for some role play as we have some children's green paramedic overalls and paramedic kit bags (equipped with bandages, plasters and pretend thermometers, blood pressure cuffs, etc.) which the children can play with, as well as two go-karts that have been fitted with working blue lights and sirens.

Our aim is not to teach first aid to primary aged children, this is carried out by St John during Year 3, Year 4 and Year 5, but to help them become more familiar with the Ambulance Service and our role within the community.

The Secondary School session, on 'Beach Safety', is a PowerPoint presentation and is aimed at 13-15 year olds. The topics covered are as follows: tides, cliffs, what to do if you need rescuing, glass, weeverfish and jellyfish, stings, BBQs and alcohol. Discussion and students' own experiences are encouraged throughout the presentation. All students will also have the opportunity to practice the Recovery Position.



The Children's Dental Service is situated at the Princess Elizabeth Hospital. We provide dental care for children attending special needs schools, looked after children and children whose parents are in receipt of supplementary benefit or who are eligible through MEAS (Medical Expenses Assistance Scheme). Children with specific medical needs can also access the Service through referral by medical and health care professionals. Private dentists can also refer children up to their 12th Birthday with dental decay or poor dental health. Dentists from the Children's Dental Service visit the schools annually to check the teeth of the children in Reception and Year 5.

The Department is open Mon – Fri 8.00am – 12.00pm & 1.15pm – 4.15pm.

An important aim of our service is to promote good oral health care to the children of Guernsey, through school visits and talks. We also offer the opportunity for classes to visit the department for talks and familiarisation of the dental surgery.

Tooth brushing, preventative treatments and diet advice is provided for the children who are referred to our Oral Health Nurse within the department.

Helen Long, our Oral Health Nurse, offers talks to Reception and Year 3 in the schools and other groups on request.

Topics covered

- Visiting the dentist
- Toothbrushing
- Diet for your teeth

Each class would need to allow about 45 minutes per session.

Year 6

Each school including the College of Further Education, Alderney and Herm, has a designated School Nurse who visits regularly and carries out routine health screening, as well as receiving referrals for hearing and vision assessments and concerns with physical and emotional health requested by teachers, parents and many other agencies. Le Murier and Le Rondin have School Nurses on site full-time and Les Voies has a School Nurse on site Tuesday – Thursday.

School Nurses attend drop-in sessions weekly in the Secondary Schools and students may visit confidentially with any queries or worries; no appointment is needed. Teachers and parents/carers are also welcome to attend. Monthly drop-in sessions are held in the Primary Schools to enable easier access to the School Nursing Service for both parents/carers and teachers.

The School Nurses are available every day during term time for advice and support for both teachers and parents/carers on any health concerns or emotional issues. Any health issue discussed is done so with complete confidentiality, however any issues or disclosures that raise concerns about a child's safety will be discussed with the appropriate agencies.

The School Nurses offer teaching sessions about healthy lifestyles and other health related topics in conjunction with the P.S.H.E. curriculum for Reception and Year 7.

Reception talks include: Hand washing, growing up

Year 7 talks include: Taking responsibility for your own health

Teaching and up-dating sessions for staff on the use of Epipens can be provided. Information sessions about specific medications or medical conditions can also be arranged.

The School Nurses attend parent's evenings and can provide information about a variety of health issues, including healthy eating, head lice, immunisations. Enuresis (bed-wetting), and behaviour advice is delivered by nurses who have training in these specialist areas. The team includes a Weight Management Nurse who offers healthy life style advice, support and teaching sessions.

The School Nurses offer the Teenage Immunisation Booster including Meningitis C to Year 9 students, in school, during the summer term. This follows the recommended schedule for immunisations. The H.P.V. (human papillomavirus) vaccination is offered to all female, Year 8 students. This follows the U.K. programme and consists of an information session to the Year 8 group to explain the programme, followed by a further injection a year later. All these immunisations are free; further information and consent forms are sent out just before the sessions. Students who miss their immunisations can attend catch-up clinics at Lukis House.



Relate 2U Young People's Counselling

Relate 2U offers information to young people in the sixth form at the 3 campus areas of the College of Further Education and run a course entitled 'Advanced Communication Skills' at the Grammar School.

We assist students to manage relationships in general and to develop life skills, to manage their emotions and difficult emotional situations and to deal with unspoken fears, anxiety and stress thus enabling them to be able to cope with changes in situations which create a sense of loss such as long term illness.

Some of the areas for which we educate and inform are:

- for young people affected by parental separation or divorce, family conflict or family change.
- for those who are experiencing the upset of personal relationship breakdowns.
- for the many, mostly unspoken fears that these situations give rise to affecting young people's behaviour at school and therefore affecting their development educationally, emotionally, and socially.
- for those young people who are affected by peer bullying.

We can visit tutor groups and join in special assemblies to explain the importance of communication or give group talks on chosen topics. We can take part in PSHE classes to talk about healthy relationships if required.

The Hampton Trust's DARE Team's (Domestic Abuse Relationship Education) primary aim is to raise awareness of domestic abuse & healthy relationships amongst young people in the Guernsey and Alderney community.

What we do:

The Schools Education Worker provides consistent and structured domestic abuse educational lessons to all year 7, 9 & 11 PSHE classes in all schools. Sessions are also provided in the post-16 setting where lessons are customised for groups.

The Community Education Worker provides semi-structured and tailor-made domestic abuse workshops in other youth settings.

These 2 roles were developed as part of the Domestic Abuse Strategy for Guernsey and Alderney, which was approved by the States in September 2009 and funding commencing in 2011. The strategy seeks to tackle domestic abuse through a four-pronged approach that ensures:

- There is good partnership working between all agencies involved in tackling abuse
- Effective services are provided to protect victims and their children
- A robust criminal justice response is provided
- Primary prevention in the form of education and awareness-raising is put in place to change attitudes and behaviour

Restorative Justice

Who we are.... Restorative practices/approaches place harm and its repair at the centre of its ethos and philosophy. The aim is to provide a safe process in which, wherever possible, damaged relationships can be repaired. In doing so, the restorative process provides an opportunity for learning to take place. In particular, it gives those who have caused harm a chance to learn, with the challenge and support of others, a better way to manage their relationships. The restorative process does not preclude using sanctions, but it does provide a framework for making them more meaningful as everyone is involved in decision making.

What we do....

A restorative intervention intends to repair any harm caused by an incident and enables those affected to define a way forward – rather than having a third party decide what should happen. It provides those who have been harmed the opportunity to:

- Talk about how they feel about what's happened.
- Express how they have been affected
- Seek what they need to repair the harm.

It also provides those who have caused the harm to:

- Explain their point of view.
- Face up and take responsibility for what they have done.
- Make amends in order that they can be reintegrated into their community.

How we do it.... This is done by asking the following open:

restorative questions

- What happened?
- What were you thinking?
- How were/are you feeling?
- Who do you think has been affected and how?
- What needs to happen to put things right?
- What have you learnt/what could you do differently in the future?

An agreement / contract, not legally binding, but rather made in good faith between all parties involved and signed, and this is then monitored and followed up to see if it has been adhered to.

From our research, we believe that young people leaving Guernsey to go to university or travel abroad are naïve as to the threats of trafficking and we are committed to raising awareness. We provide targeted information to equip youngsters with the knowledge of how to stay safe and decrease the risk of becoming a victim when travelling abroad to places that are popular tourist destinations but are rife with human trafficking such as Greece, Ibiza, Turkey and Thailand. GAST has the full support of the *Guernsey Border Agency* and *Guernsey Police* in our awareness campaign in the Bailiwick.

Social Justice - Curriculum Overview

The A21 Campaign is a non-profit organisation that exists to abolish injustice in the 21st century through a comprehensive system of preventative measures, victim protection, prosecution of violators, and strategic partnerships.

The A21 High School Curriculum: Bodies Are Not Commodities is a resource for secondary educators and abolitionists who want to bring awareness and action against injustice. It is being created for the purpose of ensuring more participatory and sustainable solutions to injustice issues through the educational system.

Bodies Are Not Commodities provides five interactive sessions to motivate and engage the adolescent learner with alignment to the Common Core State Standards, integrated cross-curricular relevance within the subjects of history, citizenship and literacy, critical thinking skills, and intersession extension opportunities to further awareness and prevention. It also includes Learning Labs that are designed to provide students with an interactive enquiry-based experience that provides the following opportunities: higher order thinking skills, authentic connectedness, substantive conversation, and social support and depth of knowledge.

Bodies Are Not Commodities has been developed in response to an overwhelming need for education about human trafficking among students. Its goal is to prevent human trafficking, protect students, and other pathways of engagement to be a part of the solution to end slavery.

- There are more slaves in the world today than at any other point in human history. More than 27 million people are in bondage.
- Human trafficking is the second largest criminal industry, exploiting men, women, and children for manual and sexual labour against their will.
- An estimated 100,000 children are victims of sex trafficking each year in the United States.

The Astronomy Section

of La Société Guernesiaise (Guernsey's local studies society) runs the island's Observatory at La Pointe, Rue du Lorier, St Pierre-du-Bois, near La Houguette School. It is fully equipped with a 16-inch computerised telescope, an 11-inch reflector, a 5-inch refractor, a solar telescope, an all-sky camera, laser pointers, and a lecture/meeting room for 20 people, with projection facilities.

The Astronomy Section has weekly meetings, publishes newsletters, maintains a library, has occasional lectures, and runs six-week courses under

the auspices of WEA Guernsey. New members are always welcome.



Visits to the Observatory

Visits by groups of schoolchildren (with teachers) can be arranged, without charge, although donations are always welcome. They can look through the telescopes and watch a PowerPoint presentation. If cloudy they can still see the telescopes and discuss their use.



Aim

The aim of the Guernsey Biological Records Centre is to gather, record, store, analyse, interpret and share local natural history information.

Data

Data held at the Records Centre includes:

Species - Distribution records for over 11,000 species of animals and plants in the Bailiwick.

Habitats - Maps of local habitats, nature reserves and Sites of Nature Conservation Importance.

Physical features - Maps of soil types, geology and other physical features.

Photographs - A collection of historical and recent photographs of local habitats and species.

Library - A natural history library for the Bailiwick of Guernsey is being established comprising books, journals, reports, etc.

Services

Provision of data

The data held at the Records Centre is primarily used for answering two basic types of question: Where does an organism live? What species live at a particular place?

This data is of use to many students doing biology, geography or local history projects or essays.

The Library at Les Cotils Christian Centre in St Peter Port is well stocked with theological books and has excellent study facilities. There is also a 'Youth and Teaching' section with resource materials for assemblies. The library stock is constantly being updated. Any student taking Religious Studies or Ethics should find it a very useful resource.

Location

The Library is housed in two adjoining rooms, the Andrew Mitchell and Sark Rooms, on the ground floor. A computer for public use is available in the annexe adjacent to the Sark Room. Entrance is through the main entrance in the old house. Take the lift or stairs to the floor below.

Borrowing books

System: First check whether the book is held by the Library and available for loan. This can be done on line at www.lescotilslibrary.org or by a visit to the Library where catalogues and the borrowing file are kept in the Andrew Mitchell Room. Books may be reserved for you by e-mail or telephone but must be collected and signed out in person, with details recorded in the borrowing file. This is a self-service system which relies on honesty and trust.

Borrowing time for most books is normally two months. We would ask that this rule is respected in order to keep administrative costs down, enabling the Library to continue to function as a free amenity.

Reference only books are housed in the Sark Room and oversize books in Andrew Mitchell Room.

<u>Opening times</u> 5:30-10pm every evening except Mondays. The Library is often open at other times but this is not guaranteed and we recommend checking with Reception before making a possibly wasted journey.

<u>Cost</u> The Library is a free resource but if you find it very useful, a small donation is always welcome.
